In the first two months of the year, need has increased by 50% above the level for the same period last year, while donated food is down by 1%. Stocks in the warehouse are at rock bottom and we have only been able to meet the need for some basic foodstuffs by purchasing them and, more painfully, rationing the amount of food supplied to each client. This causes us misery!

All this makes the success of our one day special collection at Tesco, Southport on Saturday July 15th more important than ever and your help on that day is vital. Important, too, is the need to spread the word about the needs we have and the support we give to local families experiencing crises, in order to increase and sustain donation levels in the future.

The help you already give is very much appreciated - please help now in any way you can.

Our Distribution Centres – St Simon's

Whichever of our distribution centres you visit you can be sure of a warm, friendly welcome, as I experienced myself when turning up in 'civvies' at St Simon and St Jude with All Souls on Norwood Road. The centre is often referred to as SCC or

Sefton Community Centre after the building they operate from, which is leased by the church to Sefton CVS.

Guided by Peter Middleton, the team supporting the operation is 16 strong with some of its members having been there since the early days in May 2013 and others being more recent recruits. The volunteers see their service there as Christianity in action, demonstrating God's love to all.

Open from 11 to 2 each Wednesday, the 16 volunteers make full use of modern technology, using Doodle to volunteer on the staff rotas and ensuring there is adequate support week by week.

Located near the residential area of High Park, they are conveniently located for clients in that part of town and, like most of our outlets, have experienced a substantial increase in demand over the past months.

Moving the food around





Singing for our clients' supper




Foodbanks have overheads and, no matter how careful we are, there is a minimum level of expenditure we just cannot escape.
